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Miriam Bradshaw writes of her work:

Valencia, Spain's third-largest city is a bustling shipping port on the western Mediterranean coast of Spain, a popular tourist destination with history, good beaches, parks and museums. It is also the destination of many Africans crossing the sea on crowded boats leaking water or flying in on tourist visas that will never use the return flight. They come to escape poverty, to find safety from political persecution and violence or for a better lifestyle. At night the parks are marked by North African men and rough-sleeping locals and Latino immigrants, many existing with addictions, mental problems, unstable relationships and lack of work. What they have in common is that they, like us, are people made in God's image, searching for survival, dignity and community.



Misión Evangelical Urbana de Valencia was established in 1994 by 7 local churches to express practical and spiritual love for their neighbour. Its main objective is to help people experiencing, or at risk of, social exclusion, by offering to meet basic needs in a safe environment, and to restore dignity, regardless of individual circumstances. Miriam is one of the volunteers serving these women who suffer from trauma, mental breakdown or addiction. Once a week she joins other volunteers to offer a healthy breakfast, help with personal hygiene, and to listen, read God's word to those interested and to pray for and with them. Mostly the results of the ministry are not known, but sometimes they are encouraged by seeing fruit from these compassionate labours. One example is Idris from North Africa who developed a relationship with one volunteer, gradually talking more and more about Jesus. One night Idris rang his friend to say he finally understood and wanted to be baptised and share the truth about Jesus with his family.

As well as her work with the disenfranchised emigrants, Miriam asks prayer for the youth group. This year the annual youth camp saw many more kids bringing Bibles, engaging actively and taking responsibility. Pray that the leadership team will know how to motivate kids to live out the gospel and invite their friends to camp next time. Also thank God for a couple who have recently expressed interest in helping with the youth ministry. And thank God for Sofia's growth in faith, especially as she and Miriam meet with another woman to start a Christian book club and delve deeper into Christian thinking.

Pray for a refreshing summer holiday for Miriam, and worthwhile time back in Australia in December.



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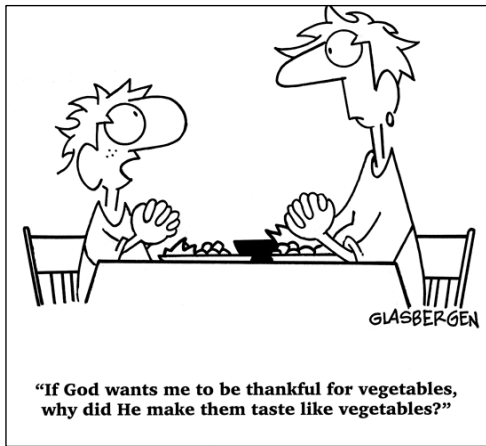
Prayer Spot

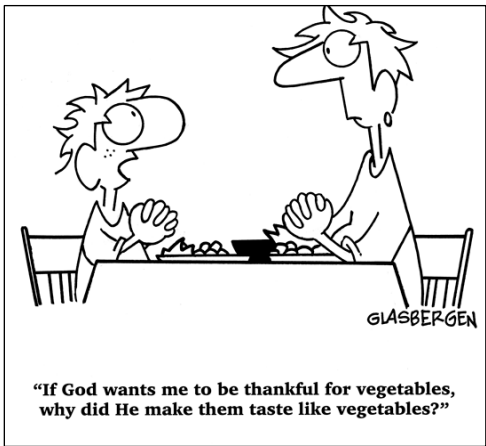
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A little sleep, a little slumber...(Prov 6:10)
